Shoreham Port Today



- We handle an average of 2m tonnes of cargo and 6,500 tonnes of fish per year
- We employ 130 colleagues directly and a further 20 through our resourcing agency
- We are currently home to 170 business tenants and growing
- Our Port spans 250 acres and we are responsible for six nautical miles of water
- Revenues in 2021 of c£16m






















The Royal Escape





1651 – Charles II flees via Shoreham

Future monarch Charles II fled from the Roundheads after being defeated at the Battle of Worcester.

Nicolas Tettersell

Charles II was introduced to Nicolas Tettersell, a local man who owned a small coal brig the 'Surprise'.

The Royal Escape

Accompanied by Tettersell on the Surprise Charles successfully fled to Normandy. Charles returned to England in 1660, thankful for saving his life he made Tettersell a Captain in the Navy.





